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OIL TRAIN SAFETY SYMPOSIUM TO BE HELD APRIL 27

LAKEWOOD, WASHINGTON – Transportation of oil by rail has greatly increased over the past several years, creating higher potential for safety risks in the region along with economic activity.

To address emerging safety issues concerning oil-by-rail including industry procedures, incident response and the development of regulations, the Pacific NorthWest Economic Region's Center for Regional Disaster Resilience is hosting the Oil Train Safety Symposium from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. April 27 at Clover Park Technical College in Lakewood, Washington. This event is focused on safety and spill response and will not address other concerns related to the movement of oil by train.

The symposium will bring together government and environmental regulators, first responders, leaders in private industry, experts in spill response and state legislators to address oil train safety issues in a regional context. Legislators to speak include Sen. Chuck Winder of Idaho, Reps. Gael Tarleton, Jessyn Farrell, and Luis Moscoso from Washington and Rep. Barbara Smith-Warner of Oregon.

“It is important that we understand all the ramifications for the movement of crude oil by rail. This event will help attendees understand the sources of oil and what is being done to facilitate its safe movement across the Pacific Northwest,” said Winder, co-chair of the PNWER Transportation Working Group and member of the Idaho Senate Transportation Committee. “We need to be doing everything possible to prevent accidents and understand the best ways to respond if there is a derailment. I appreciate the broad participation by government and industry.”

Topics will include:

- Overview of oil-by-rail in the region: demand, current shipments, roles and responsibilities of companies, railroads, federal, state and provincial governments and tank car manufacturers
- Public safety planning for potential oil-by-rail incidents
- Current and proposed oil train safety regulations
- Ecological spill response: local capabilities and capacities to respond
- Response from public officials and stakeholders
