



Summer 2023 Evacuation Orders



Challenges

- Constant state of change

- national and international emergency management mutual aid agreements






2023 season summary

497 wildfires occurred with 1,466,644
hectares burned. Power poles and remote cabins were burned.
2023 was one of the longest and most impacting seasons in the last decade.

SPSA supported the evacuation of 340 residents from 3 northern communities and assisted our partner, Meadow Lake Tribal Council, with the evacuation of 1060 residents from 6 northern communities due to wildfire threat and/or wildfire smoke impacts.



SPSA was able to provide wildfire assistance to our mutual aid partners in Alaska, Alberta, Quebec, British Columbia, Yukon, Parks Canada as well as firefighters, Incident Command Team members, air tankers, equipment and support staff to the Northwest Territories.
